Introduction




This Community Consultation is being undertaken to provide an early opportunity for the community and stakeholders to consider and comment upon the broad development proposals in relation to the proposed Rolled Tubular Facility including associated access, infrastructure and landscaping areas to former Nigg Oil Terminal, Nigg, Tain.

A Proposal of Application Notice (PoAN) has recently been submitted to The Highland Council. This is a statutory requirement for major planning applications and developers are required to engage with the community to assist in the shaping of the proposals, understanding local concerns and opportunities. Over the next month, two consultation events will be held at the Duthac Centre, Tain, the first event will take place on Wednesday 11th June between 2-6pm and the second event will take place on Wednesday 25th June between 2-6pm. The PoAN is in the initial stage of the planning process and provides an opportunity for engagement with the public.

To assist in delivering a sustainable, high quality development, Global Energy Group and The Port of Nigg have commissioned a team of consultants who have considerable experience working on projects of a similar scale and style, and have a proven track record of successfully delivering projects that align with the aspirations of nearby communities. Global Energy Group, The Port of Nigg and the design team are committed to meaningful community and stakeholder engagement at an early stage of the design proposals and All feedback from the consultation event will inform the design process that wll be incorporated into the second consultation event.

In addition to this consultation, further comment and advice will be obtained from Community Councils and the various statutory bodies.

Any comments made to the prospective applicant at this time are not representations to the Council and would not be considered as part of any future application. If the prospective applicant subsequently submits a formal application for planning permission there will be an opportunity to make representations on that application direct to the Council.

Green Freeport Status

An initiative of the UK and Scottish Governments, the Green Freeport was designated by Parliament and opened for business in April 2024 This strategic designation includes key industrial locations such as Nigg, Invergordon, Deephaven, Inverness, and Ardersier.

What is a Green Freeport?

Green Freeports are specially designated zones that offer tax, customs, and financial incentives to attract investment, encourage innovation, and support economic regeneration. In Scotland, Green Freeports are designed to also help deliver the country's net-zero emissions targets.


These zones focus on:

- Driving inclusive growth and skills development

What it Means for the Highlands


The Green Freeport designation is expected to deliver transformational benefits to the Highland economy, particularly in offshore wind, renewable energy manufacturing, and maritime logistics.
